## COUNTY EXECUTIVE GANNON APPOINTS TRACEY PERRY AS PUBLIC ADMINISTRATOR

Jefferson County Executive Dennis Gannon has appointed Tracey Perry as Public Administrator. She replaces Steve Farmer, who retired May 22, 2023. He served as Public Administrator since January 1, 2013. In accordance with the Jefferson County Home Rule Charter, Perry is affiliated with the same political party as Farmer.



Perry has a master's degree in Human Resources Management, bachelor's degree in Social Work, over 20 years of military experience, and 19 years of experience working specifically with the Jefferson County Public Administrator's office assisting with the care and oversight of the appointed wards as a social worker.

Her experience includes over 25 years assisting civilians, veterans, and families, coordinating services, and clinically representing on a multidisciplinary team addressing the needs of assigned demographics. Additionally, she has over 15 years of experience in counseling, advocacy, and program coordination.

Perry will serve out the remainder of the term, which will expire December 31, 2024.

## Jason Emmons is New Municipal Prosecutor



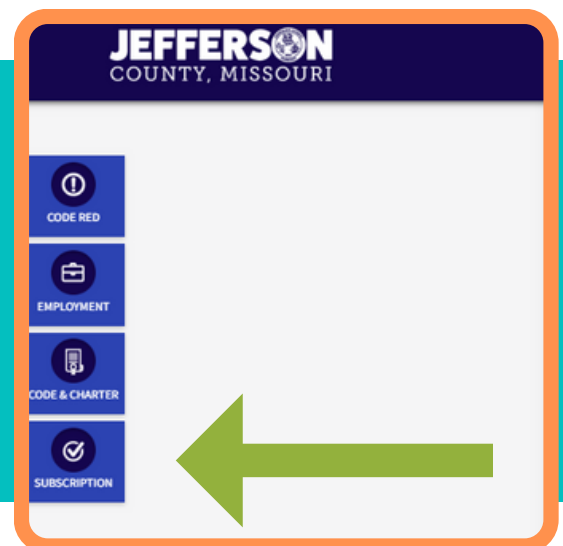

## OUTDOOR WARNING SIRENS TO BE FUNDED BY GRANT



Spring in Missouri means severe weather, and few sounds are more synonymous with this than the wail of an outdoor warning siren. Though commonplace in many Jefferson County municipalities, there are no sirens currently located in the County's unincorporated areas. But, with the help of a Federal grant, the Office of Emergency Management (OEM) and the County's Public Safety Commission (PSC) are working on changing that.

Expansion of the local hazardous weather alert system has been on the radar for several years.

A contract was recently awarded to ATI Systems to develop an acoustic coverage map that will identify for officials where sirens would need to be placed to ensure complete geographic coverage of the County by warning tones. "Work on this project started in 2021 when we applied for funding through the Federal Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) grant," says Warren Robinson, Director of the OEM. "The application was successful, and now that we have that funding, we can identify placement locations and use that information to make recommendations on how to best incorporate sirens into our existing warning system." Funding from the BRIC grant will cover 75% of the County's expenses related to the development of the acoustic coverage map, up to \$30,000.

Robert McLaughlin, a representative from ATI Solutions, met with officials in May to discuss the County's needs for an outdoor warning system. "There are several factors to consider that will impact system capability and end cost. Do you need a system that provides tone-only or tone and voice alerts? When you have a voice alert, the voice answers three questions: What is happening? Where do I go? What do I do? The answers to these important questions will be very different whether the event is a tornado (seek shelter underground), a wildfire (evacuate the area), or an active shooter (shelter in place). When placing the units, will you opt to cover the whole County geographically or focus on densely populated areas?" says McLaughlin.

The siren placement map is still under development, but early feedback indicates it will require approximately 230 units to provide coverage to the entire County. The PSC is weighing options, and after it has time to review the findings from ATI, will provide its recommendation to the OEM for the type and number of sirens to seek funding for. Says Robinson, "We're excited to be working on this project and hope soon to have another layer of warning capability in place for residents and visitors to the County."

# Highway Project Updates



## HIGH RIDGE BOULEVARD IMPROVEMENTS



Originally maintained by the State of Missouri as Gravois/Highway 30, High Ridge Boulevard now serves as an important main street in the High Ridge community. This county road has dozens of businesses, churches, residential subdivisions, schools, shopping plazas, and essential community services along this 2-mile corridor. The boulevard hosts several annual parades for various community events, making it an important and functional asset to the High Ridge area.

Currently, there are several deficiencies for a boulevard of such importance. There are no pedestrian access facilities, and no network of open channel ditches or closed drainage systems for proper storm water runoff control. Street lighting is also absent, and the roadway pavement surface needs preservation.

The County has secured federal and local funding for a project to construct a 10-foot concrete shared-use path along the boulevard from Crossroads Plaza to Park Road and a 5-foot concrete sidewalk along Community Lane from the boulevard to the Jefferson County Civic Center. This project will also include constructing a new storm sewer system with 4-foot concrete shoulders, and curb and gutter. Pedestrian street lighting is also being implemented to improve nighttime visibility throughout the corridor. Shoulder repairs will take place from Highway PP to Byrnes Mill city limits. The full 2-mile stretch will then be overlayed with a new asphalt wearing surface. Project construction begins in Summer 2023 and should be completed in Summer 2024. Total project costs are estimated to be \$3,000,000.

# Highway Project Updates



## OLD LEMAY FERRY ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

Old Lemay Ferry Road is one of the longest-served public roadways in Jefferson County. It has been continuously maintained by the County since the 1840s. Although it has been improved over the years to a modern paved surface, much of the roadway alignment remains very hilly with sharp curves. Historical crash data has shown safety improvements are needed in several areas along the 13-mile corridor. The County has secured six safety improvement project grants totaling nearly \$15 million in dedicated funding. These improvements have been broken up into six phases. Phases 1 and 2 started construction in the Summer of 2022 and will be completed Summer 2023. These improvements were located from south of the East Rock Creek Road and north of the Spring Forest Road intersections.



The work included the realignment and reconstruction of two-thirds of a mile (3,425 feet) of roadway, addition of 4 to 6-foot shoulders, addition of turn lanes, curb and gutter, guardrail, retaining walls, installation of a new 12-foot by 8-foot reinforced concrete box culvert, and a closed drainage storm sewer system.



Reconstruction of two county road intersections at East Rock Creek and Spring Forest was also included. These two projects involved major grading operations including a 20-foot cut and a 30-foot fill. This project opened to traffic in May 2023 and cost an estimated \$5.2 million plus utility relocation costs.

Phases 3 and 4 will likely begin in Spring 2024. This project work will be between Kneff Rd./Dry Fork Rd. to ¼ mile north of Frisco Hill Rd./East Four Ridge Rd. Phases 5 and 6 are anticipated to be constructed in 2025 and 2027 respectively. More details to come soon!

## NEW WALKING/JOGGING TRAIL AT NWSC

The walking/jogging trail at the Northwest Sports Complex was recently improved from an all gravel base to a paved surface.

This improvement allows for greater access and usability for everyone especially those with disabilities and other needs such as stroller use.

The track is approximately ½ mile around the ballfields and includes the side track leading to the pavilion/skate park areas.

The area also hosts a playground and restrooms.

## PICKLEBALL REVAMP

In April, the Department of Parks and Recreation completed the renovation of one of the pickleball courts at the High Ridge Civic Center.

This renovation included a “rubberized” tiled surface that provides for a more uniform playing surface, while also being more forgiving for joints.

There are a total of three courts, and they are generally open on a first come first serve basis.

The Old Lemay Ferry Road Improvements Phase 1 and 2 should be complete by the end of 2023 with Phase 3 and 4 starting in 2024. Also taking place in 2023-2024 is the Seckman Road through Mastodon State Park Entrance project where 8-foot shoulders, curb and gutter sections, striping and signage are being added.
