# Jefferson County Stream Clean

The Jefferson County Stream Team, led by the Stormwater Division, hosts monthly clean-up events to remove trash and litter from our local waterways. We're always looking for new volunteers! This is a great way to support the environment and for students to earn A+ community service hours.



## Why Should I Be Concerned About Polluted Streams?

Streams provide a natural habitat and food source for countless animals, fish, and aquatic life. When polluted, streams lose their ability to sustain life. Pollution slowly kills the stream and everything that depends on it. These pollutants contaminate the water, disrupt the reproductive cycles of fish, and destroy the surrounding riparian corridor. Once this ecosystem collapses, the stream dies.

## Common sources of stream pollution include:

- Sediment from unchecked erosion
- Debris from construction sites
- Dumped tires and scrap metal
- Herbicides and pesticides
- Illegal disposal of paint and chemicals



## Drinking Water Supplies

Pollution doesn't just harm wildlife, it affects us, too. Chemicals such as antifreeze, detergents, and oils alter the very makeup of our water. This not only devastates aquatic life but also contaminates drinking water supplies, leading to immeasurable economic and environmental losses.

## Project Redbird (South) Phase 3

Project Redbird (South) Phase 3 is a continuation of the multiple transportation infrastructure projects needed to support the major industrial development of the James Hardie manufacturing facility, as well as enhance accessibility for local traffic.

The purpose of the project is to build a roundabout at the Interchange Exit 170 of Interstate 55 and US 61. This project is a safety improvement that was a result of multiple rounds of engagement with the public about additional measures that would make the area safer in the interim and in the future with increased traffic loads.

The roundabout will consist of concrete pavement with a mountable truck apron; it will be integral with River Cement Road preventing traffic from making left turns across multiple lanes and overall slowdown traffic as it enters an area with multiple potential crossings.

## Saline Road Safety Improvements Project (Phase 2)



Saline Road from Northwest Boulevard to 1925 Saline Road, near Hermitage Drive, will be under construction soon following the bidding process and award of the project. The safety project includes adding 4' shoulders along the Saline segment to help keep motorists on the roadway.

Additionally, rumble strips and guardrail will be placed. Two box culverts will receive extensions on both sides of the roadway while the box culvert located near Vince Ann Drive will only be extended on one side. Driveway pipes, inlets, a retaining wall, and gutters will be installed to improve drainage. Signage will be replaced to meet MUTCD codes.

## Gravois Road Updates

Big improvements have recently started on the Gravois Northwest School Road adjacent to the Northwest Valley Middle School and House Springs Elementary School. The contractor, Infrastructure Management, started work on the project on August 18th, and plans to have construction wrapped up by late Spring of 2026.

In years past, there have been many accidents along this stretch of roadway and the Public Works staff have identified many areas to make this section of roadway safer for not only motorists, but also pedestrians. We noticed quite a few crashes on Gravois Road and determined that by adding a two-way left-turn lane, especially for those busy a.m. drop-offs and p.m. pick-up times, coming in and out of the school would reduce the majority of the rear-end crashes.

Additional construction features included within the project, but are not limited to, are concrete curb and gutter sections that will include enclosed storm sewers and drainage structures on the east (school) side of the roadway, a red-stamped concrete buffer between the edge of the roadway and the shared-use path, new streetscape street lighting through the project, modular block retaining walls, pedestrian fencing, new concrete base repairs, and a new ultra-thin bonded wearing surface for a new smooth surface.

Another added improvement to this section of roadway is the new addition of a 10' shared-use path for pedestrians. The shared-use path will connect the bus garage to the school campus, while also providing direct connectivity to the adjacent subdivisions to the school campus.

## Old Lemay Ferry Road (Phases 3 & 4)

Work continues on this section of Old Lemay Ferry Road, from Kneff Road to approximately 0.4 miles south of Regency Woods Place. Our contractor, Above and Below Contracting, has completed placing rock blanket on the large slope north of Frisco Hill Road, and has been working on the widening of the roadway base through the curve.

They are also working on culvert extensions throughout the project. Milling of the existing roadway to facilitate the new surface began at the end of August.



Additional utility adjustments have become a challenge to the work and has necessitated an extension of the road closure north of Frisco Hill Road. For the portion of the road south of Frisco Hill Road, utility work continues which has slowed progress of the road work. The contractor is working on plan revisions to the retaining wall that should reduce the construction impact on traffic in this area.

## Old Lemay Ferry Road (Phase 5)

Another section of roadway improvements is coming to the Old Lemay Ferry corridor. In 2022 and 2023, improvements were made to Old Lemay Ferry from East Rock Creek Road to Spring Forest Road. The Public Works Department plans to tie into those improvements at Spring Forest and continue to add new safety improvements on Old Lemay Ferry to Vogel Road.

The Public Works Department bid this project and awarded the project to Jokerst Paving and Contracting. Jokerst Paving plans to start construction with this project in late fall/early winter of 2025. These improvements to Old Lemay Ferry Road include adding 5' shoulders to both sides of the roadway, while also adding a left turn lane into Adobe Drive for southbound motorists.

A new concrete curb and gutter with storm sewers and grated inlets, concrete barrier walls, guardrail, and a new asphalt overlay will also be included within the project as Old Lemay Ferry currently has two 11' driving lanes. Construction will take place utilizing temporary traffic signals to allow the contractor to work under traffic without needing to close the roadway. The project is expected to be completed by the end of 2026.

## Harmony Hills Drive Bridge



Near the intersection of Vogel Road and Old Lemay Ferry Road, Harmony Hills, a private subdivision maintained by Jefferson County, will be receiving a new bridge. The existing bridge is structurally deficient and the only way in and out of the subdivision for approximately 45 homes.

The new bridge will be constructed of four concrete spread box beams resulting in a wider bridge than existing. Two concrete driveways at the northwest and southeast corners of the bridge will be replaced, and rock blankets will be added in Pomme Creek to protect the new bridge.

The main challenge for this project is the accessibility to residents in a narrow construction limit, 317 feet long; therefore, the bridge will be constructed in stages. Construction will begin and conclude in 2026 with the contractor having 130 working days.






Cherlynn attends all County Council meetings and work sessions, where she records the official meeting minutes and prepares the certified record for submission to the County Clerk.

She also serves as the Custodian of Records for the County Council, managing Sunshine Law Requests directed to the Council and coordinating with the County Counselor to ensure compliance with applicable statutes and procedures. In her role, she also serves as the primary liaison for the County Council, facilitating communication and coordination between the Council and other County offices, departments, and the public.

Council Meetings take place at 6:30 p.m. on the second and fourth Monday of each month in the Assembly Room at the Administration Center, located at 729 Maple Street in Hillsboro. If a Monday falls on a holiday or otherwise noted, the schedule may change. Meeting agendas are posted on the website at least 72 hours in advance, and minutes are published online after they are approved by the Council.

# Winter Storm Planning Timeline

## A few days out

If the forecast calls for winter weather, start preparing now.

-  Have emergency supplies for your home & car
-  Check your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors
-  Replenish fuel for your car and heating sources

## The day before

Forecast accuracy continues to improve, so keep checking the latest.

-  Adjust plans
-  Have multiple ways to receive Warnings
-  Bring pets indoors and ensure they have water

## During & After

Remain vigilant and stay informed. Drive only if necessary.

-  Check on neighbors and family
-  Properly ventilate emergency heat sources
-  Keep generators at least 20 feet from your home
-  Take it easy when shoveling

Black ice forms when rain or snowmelt freezes into a thin, nearly invisible layer on the road. It's most common overnight and often sticks around into the morning.

Even if pavement looks clear, black ice can catch you off guard. To stay safe, reduce your speed, leave extra distance between vehicles, and avoid sudden braking or sharp turns.

Pay special attention on bridges, overpasses, and shaded areas where ice forms first and melts last.

## Protect People, Pets, Pipes, & Plants from cold weather



### People

Minimize time outdoors.  
 Prepare for power outages.  
 Check on elderly & other vulnerable people to make sure they're ok.



### Pets

Keep your pets warm, dry & indoors as much as possible.  
 Ensure their food & water doesn't freeze.  
 Limit outside time & keep them bundled up.



### Pipes

Insulate pipes if possible.  
 Open up sink cabinets to expose pipes to heated air.  
 Disconnect hoses & turn off water to sprinklers.



### Plants

Know their temperature thresholds.  
 If possible, cover them before the cold weather sets in to help retain some heat.

## Don't Underestimate Sleet Dangers



**Take it easy when shoveling.**  
 Sleet can be much more dense than snow. Go slowly and don't overexert yourself.



**Use extreme caution when driving.**  
 Sleet can cause dangerous road conditions and reduced visibility.

- ▶ Reduce speed
- ▶ Allow plenty of stopping distance
- ▶ Do not use cruise control
